Conversation 4:

Page 23: The most excellent method he found of going to God was to do our normal activities without any view of pleasing men, and (as far as we are able) for the pure love of God.

It is easy to suppose this would be much easier for a man or a woman isolated from the world in a monastery or convent than for busy active people who have many responsibilities and people to deal with on daily basis. I expect that during this pandemic isolation many people have learned this is not true.

We often hear and perhaps even say, "I don't care what anyone thinks about what I do." When I say that or when I hear someone say that, I know that they or I most certainly do care and know that we are not pleasing anyone, lest of all ourselves. The solution to this problem is to turn our thoughts toward God and seek to please Him.

Page 25:

When we begin the spiritual life, we should thoroughly examine what we are.

It is difficult for people to truly examine who and what they are: There are two traps that the human-being must avoid. The first one is looking at all our faults and deciding that we are worthless and losing all hope. Another trap is to avoid looking our sins and our weaknesses thereby becoming incapable for change and growth.

"In the gentle mirror of God," Catherine writes, "the believer when at prayer, sees her own dignity; that through no merit of her but by his creation she is the image of God."
